Northern Ireland Terrorism Legislation: Annual Statistics 2009/10

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1. The Terrorism Act 2000 received Royal Assent on 20 July 2000 and came into force on 19 February 2001. Between 20 July 2000 and 19 February 2001, the provisions of the Northern Ireland (Emergency Provisions) Act 1996 (EPA) were maintained by Schedule 1 to the Terrorism Act. The Terrorism Act provides permanent United Kingdom (UK)-wide counter-terrorist legislation and reforms and replaces the EPA, the Prevention of Terrorism (Temporary Provisions) Act 1989 (PTA) and sections one to four of the Criminal Justice (Terrorism and Conspiracy) Act 1998.
2. The Terrorism Act provides a legal framework and specific powers to combat the threat from all kinds of terrorist groups in a way that is consistent with Human Rights obligations. The UK-wide part of the Act is permanent, to ensure that powers needed to respond to terrorist threat are readily available. The Northern Ireland specific part of the Act (Part VII) was time-limited to five years. Subject to annual renewal, these temporary provisions were due to lapse in February 2006. The Terrorism (Northern Ireland) Act 2006 came into force on 18th February 2006, the main purpose of which is to extend those provisions of Part VII still in effect, until 31st July 2007. The Counter-Terrorism Act (2008) increased police powers for the stated purpose of countering terrorism and received royal assent on 26 November 2008.
3. The content of this bulletin will be kept under review and additional information will be included when relevant material becomes available.
4. This bulletin is designed to report on the key Northern Ireland specific Terrorism Act statistics. It should be noted that figures may be subject to minor revision, as most data are drawn from administrative or operational data sources.

Summary for 2009/10:

- ◆ There were 128 designated cordons under section 33 (Table 1).
- ◆ Under section 37, Schedule 5, there were 87 premises searched under warrant by the Police Service of Northern Ireland (Table 2).
- ◆ There were 167 persons detained under section 41 of the Act (Table 3), 158 (95%) of whom were held for 48 hours or less (Table 6).
- ◆ There were 10 applications for extensions of detention, all of which were granted (Table 3).
- ◆ Thirty-six persons were charged with 74 offences including 5 charges of murder, 16 firearms offences and 7 explosives offences (Table 4 and Table 7a & 7b).
- ◆ Eight persons were charged with 9 Terrorism Act offences including 3 for possession for terrorist purposes, 2 with collecting information and 4 offences for membership (Table 5a).
- ◆ No-one was charged during 2009/10 with offences under the new terrorism legislation (Table 5b).
- ◆ There were 60 requests to have someone informed of detention, all of which were granted immediately (Table 8).
- ◆ There were 167 requests for access to a solicitor, all of which were granted immediately (Table 9).
- ◆ Under section 44, there were 28,770 persons, and 31,014 vehicles stopped and searched (Table 10).
- ◆ Under section 80, there were 5 persons convicted of a scheduled offence (Table 11).
- ◆ There was 1 requisition order and 2 de-requisition orders made (Table 12).
- ◆ Compensation payments (including solicitors' and loss assessors' fees and Agency payments) totalled £115,427 (Table 13).
- ◆ New powers provided under the Terrorism Act (2006) and Counter Terrorism Act (2008) were not utilised during 2009/10 (Tables 14-19).

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Guide to the Tables

Table 1

Under section 33 of the Terrorism Act 2000 a cordoned area may be designated only if the person making it considers it expedient for the purposes of a terrorist investigation. Prior to the Terrorism Act 2000, this power was contained in section 16c of the Prevention of Terrorism (Temporary Provisions) Act 1989.

Table 2

Schedule 5 (made effective by section 37) provides that a constable may apply to a justice of the peace for the issue of a warrant for the purposes of a terrorist investigation. A warrant authorises any constable (a) to enter the premises specified in the warrant, (b) to search the premises and any person found there and (c) to seize and retain any relevant material which is found on a search under part (b). Prior to the Terrorism Act 2000, this power was contained in Schedule 7, part 1 to the Prevention of Terrorism (Temporary Provisions) Act 1989.

Tables 3-7

Section 41 of the Terrorism Act 2000 provides that a constable may arrest without a warrant a person whom he or she reasonably suspects to be a terrorist. A person detained under section 41 may only be held by the police for a maximum of 48 hours unless an application has been made under paragraph 29 or 36 of Schedule 8 asking a court to issue or extend a warrant of further detention. Section 41(7) provides that if a warrant is issued a person may be detained for the period specified therein, for a period up to seven days. Section 306 of the Criminal Justice Act 2003 was brought into force by Commencement Order on 20 January 2004 and amends Part III of Schedule 8 to the Terrorism Act, extending the maximum period of detention from seven to fourteen days. Changes brought in the Terrorism Act (2006) allowed for the maximum period of detention without charge to be extended from 14 days to 28.

Table 8

Section 41 (Schedule 8, paragraph 6) provides that a person detained in police custody under the terrorism provisions shall be entitled to have a friend or relative informed of their detention. Requests to have someone informed must be complied with as soon as it is practicable and in any case within 48 hours. Delay in complying with the request can be authorised only in certain clearly defined circumstances. Prior to the Terrorism Act 2000, this power was contained in section 46 of the Northern Ireland (Emergency Provisions) Act 1996.

Table 9

Section 41 (Schedule 8, paragraph 7) provides that a person detained in police custody under the terrorism provisions shall be entitled to consult a solicitor privately. Such requests must be permitted as soon as is practicable and in any case within 48 hours. However, a delay in complying with such a request may be authorised, but only in strict circumstances defined in the Terrorism Act. Prior to the Terrorism Act 2000, this power was contained in section 47 of the Northern Ireland (Emergency Provisions) Act 1996.

Table 10

Section 44 of the Terrorism Act 2000 gives the police powers to stop and search vehicles and their occupants, and pedestrians, for the prevention of terrorism. Authorisations apply to a specific area and are for a maximum of 28 days (though that period may be reviewed).

Table 11

Section 80 applies where (a) a person is sentenced to imprisonment or a term of detention in a young offenders centre for a period exceeding one year (b) he or she is discharged from prison or the centre in pursuance of prison rules, and (c) before his or her sentence or term would have expired (but for the discharge) he or she commits, and is convicted on indictment of, a scheduled offence. If the court before which he or she is convicted of the scheduled offence sentences him or her to imprisonment or a term of detention it shall in addition order him or her to be returned to prison or a young offenders centre for the period between the date of the order and the date on which the original sentence or term would have expired but for his or her discharge.

Table 12

If the Secretary of State considers it necessary for the preservation of peace or the maintenance of order, he may authorise a person to take possession of land or other property, and carry out works on land, which has been so requisitioned (section 91). Prior to the Terrorism Act 2000, this power was contained in section 26 of the Northern Ireland (Emergency Provisions) Act 1996 or section 19 of the Emergency Provisions Act 1978.

Table 13

Schedule 12 (made effective by section 102) allows for compensation to be claimed from the Secretary of State where property is taken, occupied, destroyed or damaged, or any other private property rights are interfered with as a consequence of action taken under part VII of the Act. Prior to the Terrorism Act 2000, this power was contained in section 55 of the Northern Ireland (Emergency Provisions) Act 1996.

Table 14

Section 28 Terrorism Act (2006) enables a JP to grant a warrant for a search of premises for terrorist publications. Grants power of seizure for terrorist publications.

Table 15

Section 1 Counter Terrorism Act (2008) grants powers to the police to examine documents during a search and to remove any documents for consideration as to whether they need to be legally seized as part of an investigation.

Table 16

Section 24 Counter Terrorism Act (2008) allows a district judge (magistrate's court) to authorise post-charge questioning of a suspect for a specified period.

Table 17

Section 45 Counter Terrorism Act (2008) places notification requirements on persons convicted of certain terrorist offences.

Table 18

Section 57 Counter Terrorism Act (2008) enables the police to make application to the court to impose notification requirements on persons convicted of certain offences overseas.

Table 19

Section 58 Counter Terrorism Act (2008) enables an application to a court to impose foreign travel restriction orders on particular suspects.
